S. 1789	Akaka #1	To strike Title III: Federal Employees' Compensation Act
S. 1789	Akaka #2	To strike sections 302 and 303 (the changes in benefits sections) and replaces them with a GAO study to determine the appropriate levels of compensation. Also, this amendment adds in two provisions previously rejected regarding covering terrorism injuries and zone of armed conflict paperwork extension.
S. 1789	Akaka #3	To strike the retirement reduction to FECA (50 percent at normal social security retirement age), makes the bill prospective and adds in two provisions previously rejected covering terrorism injuries and zone of armed conflict paperwork extension.
S. 1789	Akaka #4	To eliminate the retroactive changes to workers' compensation and include a hardship exception for people if they qualify for food stamps
S. 1789	Akaka #5	To strike section 103 (relating to Medicare coverage for Postal Service Medicare eligible annuitants)
S. 1789	Akaka #6	Converts the Medigap program with Medicare Parts A and B to a voluntary pilot program that sunsets in five years.
S. 1789	Akaka #7	Strikes the existing arbitration language and replaces it with the Akaka language that says nothing in the bill limits factors the board may take into consideration.
S. 1789	Akaka #8	To modify the Postal Service Retiree Health Benefits Fund to end prefunding and then transitions the program to an amortization schedule over 40 years. The amendment also establishes the Postal Service Retiree Health Benefits Investment Board, and allows for the investment of assets of the RHBF in non-government broad-based market indexes.
S. 1789	Begich #1	Adds to the arbitration section the Akaka compromise language saying nothing in Title 39 limits the factors an arbitration board may take into consideration after the provisions saying the arbitrator must take into account the financial state of the postal service.
S. 1789	Begich #2	To clarify the meaning of comparability in the law for arbitration. It would specify that comparability of pay and benefits should be similar to large national employers.
S. 1789	Coburn #1	Allowing for immediate five-day delivery
S. 1789	Coburn #2	Allowing for closure of unprofitable rural post offices
S. 1789	Coburn #3	To require arbitrators to consider time spent paying workers to do nothing when negotiating contracts
S. 1789	Coburn #4	Establishing a do-not-mail program aimed at stemming "junk" mail.
S. 1789	Coburn #5	Ending the mail box monopoly in rural areas
S. 1789	Coburn #6	Requiring Alaska to reimburse the Postal Service for Bypass mail
S. 1789	Johnson #1	Strikes the additional service credits
S. 1789	Levin #1	Easing restrictions on the Postal Service in the licensing of its intellectual property.
S. 1789	Levin #2	Prohibiting stamps honoring living people.
S. 1789	Levin #3	Prohibiting Postal Service contracts that restrict congressional oversight
S. 1789	Lieberman #1 (Collins-Carper-Brown)	In the nature of a substitute
S. 1789	McCain #1	To limited the scope of collective bargaining agreement provisions relating to reduction-in-force procedures
S. 1789	McCain #2	To establish a BRAC-like Commission on Postal Reorganization to close post office and processing facilities
S. 1789	McCain #3	Establishes a Control Board to oversee the Postal Service.
S. 1789	McCain #4	Requires the Postal Service and it's employees to pay the same cost share of FEHB as the rest of the federal government.
S. 1789	McCain #5	Allows for immediate five-delivery
S. 1789	McCain #6	Substitute--Issa bill as introduced
S. 1789	McCain #7	To establish a Postal Service advertising program
S. 1789	McCaskill #1	To strike section 206

S. 1789	McCaskill #2	Prohibits five-day if the Postal Service's deficit can be attributed to payments to the retiree health benefit fund.
S. 1789	Moran #1 (Tester, Collins, Pryor, Begich, McCaskill)	Suspends the closing of post offices until the establishment of retail service standards
S. 1789	Paul #1	Would end the mailbox monopoly and allow customers to choose who can deposit mail
S. 1789	Paul #2	Establishes a do-not-mail program aimed at "junk" mail.
S. 1789	Paul #3	Reallocates how the would account for costs, would require that all products cover costs, and require a GAO report on progress.
S. 1789	Paul #4	This is the same as the McCain no lay off amendment.
S. 1789	Paul #5	Ending reduced rates for political parties and organizations
S. 1789	Paul #6	To require the closing of post offices in the Capitol Complex
S. 1789	Pryor #1	To apply protections in post offices closing to branches and stations.
S. 1789	Pryor #2	To require the Postal Service to explain its rationale for not adhering to a PRC advisory opinion
S. 1789	Tester #1	To provide for a reduction in the maximum limitation on pay and bonuses of officers and employees of the Postal Service
S. 1789	McCaskill #3 (or 2nd degree)	GAO access to New Hires database – broad v. FECA-only
